Each section also includes opportunities for deeper exploration to keep the magic going long after the curtain falls.

ESSENTIAL QUESTION


How does Cirque du Soleil's 'TWAS THE NIGHT BEFORE... invite us to rediscover the wonder of the holiday season, exploring how imagination, tradition, and community help us believe in magic at any age?

KEY LEARNING OBJECTIVES

- Discover the world of Cirque du Soleil through a live performance and hands-on activities.
- Examine how elements of costumes, music, acrobatics, and theatrical design create a magical winter wonderland inspired by the classic holiday poem.
- Reflect on how holiday traditions and stories can inspire wonder and connection across generations.
- Develop their own imaginations and make personal connections to the performance.

ABOUT THE SHOW

It's the holidays, and this year things are different. For as long as she can remember, Isabella and her father have read "A Visit from Saint Nicholas"—the classic 'Twas the Night Before Christmas poem—together. But now Isabella feels she has outgrown the family tradition. Suddenly, the magic of the poem whirls to life, sweeping Isabella and her father into a snowstorm that sets them on a fantastical journey. In a winter wonderland filled with whimsical characters, dazzling acrobats, playful reindeer, and spirited children, they discover the joy of togetherness and rediscover the true magic of the holidays.



FUN FACTS

The roller skaters perform on a 350-pound Platform only 6 FEET in diameter, reaching speed of 30 mph.

The hair and makeup dept requires

25 pots of glitter and 60 cans of hairspray, during the shows run.

The hair suspension artist performs about 100 turns and spins as fast as

7 revolutions per second supported by a performer whose hair can withstand 250 pounds of dynamic pressure.

- TWAS THE NIGHT BEFORE... marks Cirque du Soleil's inaugural production focused on the holiday season.
- Each performance uses nearly 5 dump trucks worth of artificial snow, which is cleaned and reused.
- * 50 different costumes are used in the show, including eight reindeer costumes that each require 2,000 sequins.
- Despite a smaller cast than many Cirque du Soleil shows, the performers represent 21 different countries.
- * 'Twas the Night Before Christmas was first published in 1823 as a poem called "A Visit from Saint Nicholas" by Clement Moore
- Music is at the heart of Cirque du Soleil's storytelling. In this show, you'll hear a soundtrack of 41 songs—including 29 original pieces and fresh arrangements of beloved holiday songs like "Jingle Bells," "Silent Night," and "Deck the Halls."

MEET THE CHARACTERS



ISABELLA

A young girl who loves everything trendy and new. She thinks she's outgrown the joy of the holidays and often takes her family for granted—especially her father.



Isabella's Dad misses the close bond they once had. He hopes the magic Clement Moore's famous poem will help his daughter rediscover the holiday spirit.



JOLLY

A colorful, comedic free spirit who guides Isabella with humor and kindness. Only at the very end is his identity revealed – he's Santa Claus!



Energetic, playful dancers who bring the spirit of the holidays alive and move our story along, until we find out that they are actually Santa's elves!



AVA

A spoiled starlet who craves attention and gifts. However, when she decides to share a gift with Isabella, she discovers the true magic of the season.







+ DISCUSSION SPARKS +

- Which character reminds you most of yourself—or someone in your family? Why?
- Isabella changes her mind about the holidays. What made her see things differently?
- Jolly uses humor and kindness to guide Isabella. How do you like to spread joy to others?
- Ava learns that sharing feels better than getting. What's a gift you've given that made you feel happy inside?

GO DEEPER

<u>At Home or in Class:</u> After the show, choose one character and retell the story from their point of view. (For example: What would the story sound like if Ava or Jolly were narrating it?)

<u>Extension:</u> Draw a picture of your favorite character and add a speech bubble showing what they might say about the holidays.

STORYTELLING & IMAGINATION

Create Your Own Holiday Poem:

- Begin with the classic line: 'Twas the night before..."
- Add your own twist. Think of something funny, magical, or special to you.
 (Maybe "...the big snowball fight" or "...Grandma's gingerbread bake-off.")
- Keep the rhythm. Each new line should tell what's happening, just like in the poem.
- Share it. Read your poem aloud to family, friends, or classmates!

Go Deeper:

<u>Move with Your Poem:</u> Choreograph a short dance or create simple acrobatic-style movements to act out your poem. Use some of the moves you saw in 'Twas the Night Before... as inspiration—like spins, jumps, balances, or playful gestures.

Add Music: Choose a favorite holiday song to accompany your poem.



A SEASON OF GIVING

The holidays are about more than presents—they're about kindness, generosity, and community. In 'Twas the Night Before..., Isabella learns that sharing and connection bring more joy than any gift. Let her journey inspire you to spread a little holiday magic of your own.

Graditude Ornament

- Cut out a paper circle (or decorate a real ornament).
- Write or draw one thing you're thankful for.
- Hang it on a tree, window, or "gratitude wall" so everyone can see your holiday spirit grow.

Ways to Give as a Family

Choose one way to brighten someone else's season:

- Bake cookies for neighbors or first responders.
- Donate gently used coats, toys, or books.
- Create holiday cards for a local nursing home or hospital.

Holiday Traditions Across Generations


Interview a grandparent, elder, or family friend about their holiday traditions.

Can you spot the magic? Search for words from the show hidden in this puzzle—look up, down, sideways, and even backwards!


